### 19 October: Military Appreciation Night and Annual Dinner Meeting

An annual sumptuous event for the Newport County Council, this year's event was held again at the Newport Wyndham Hotel and Resort. The Council invites active-duty sea services members and spouses to be its guests at a dinner in appreciation of their service. Navy League Members, Community Affiliates and Business Members defray the costs. Guest Speaker for the evening was Rear Admiral John W. Mauger, USCG, First District Commander (D1) U.S. Coast Guard, who assumed his duties in May 2022 oversees all Coast Guard missions across eight states in the Northeast including over 2,000 miles of coastline from the U.S.- Canadian border to northern New Jersey and 1300 miles offshore.

He previously served as the Assistant Commandant for Prevention Policy, responsible for the development of national policy, standards, and programs promoting Marine Safety, Security and Environmental Stewardship.

His awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Coast Legion of Merit (two awards), Coast Guard Meritorious Service Medal (five awards), the Coast Guard Commendation Medal (three awards), the DHS Secretary's Exceptional Service Gold Medal, and the EPA Administrator's Silver Medal. A native of Jenkintown, PA, RADM Mauger resides in Wellesley, MA with his wife, Leah, and two children.

During the time of his taking command, RADM Mauger had to oversee operations for the recovery of the Titan submersible, the cone cap of which had exploded on the morning of June 18, killing all 5 people on board. The Titan had descended to view the wreckage of the Titanic. It was scheduled to return in the afternoon to a Canadian research vessel, the Polar Prince, that was providing surface support about 900 nautical miles east of Cape Cod. About 1 hour and 45 minutes after the Titan plunged below the surface, the Polar Prince lost contact with it and notified the Coast Guard. An international search-and-rescue operation began and followed by a 3 month recovery mission.

Citing this as an example, the RADM built an education for the audience on the absolute necessity of the Coast Guard, not only as a protecter and defender of the nations' shores and sea ways, but as reliable humanitarian aid and critical strength provider to US allies. He quoted many heroic "Coasties" who had performed rescues at Sea, putting their life in peril, and in some cases losing it.

In his first weeks of command, he also was a Guest of Honor at the Commissiong of the Jester in Newport. With the arrival of more Coast Guard Cutters and NOAA ships at NAVSTA Newport, the Coast Guard is going to be a very visible valuable asset in Northeast waters. (cont.)

The Newport County Council hosted their Community Affiliates and Business Members at a festive reception of holiday specialties at The Wyndham Resort. As a special treat 2 sets of admission tickets donated by the Audrain Auto Museum, which is a legendary museum and fixture in the community for vintage and antique car enthusiasts, were raffled to attendees. Guest Speaker for the evening, the new Commanding Officer of Naval Station Newport, presented a casual but excellent overview of recent and ongoing developments and programs at the Base. As many of the Business and Community Affiliates are in the naval and maritime industries, this gave them an opportunity to get a head start on 2024 business plans.

Captain Henry M. Roenke IV, USN, a native of Geneva, New York, began his naval career at the U.S. Naval Academy, graduating with distinction in 1998 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Ocean Engineering. He is a 2023 graduate of the United States Naval War College, earning a Master of Arts in National Security and Strategic Studies. He assumed the duties as the Commanding Officer of Naval Station Newport, RI on July 28, 2023.

He started his presentation off refreshingly with the words, "A little background – I have no experience in installation management prior to change of command this past July. My previous jobs in the Navy have been on Submarines or in Intelligence. This means my perspective is "fresh". What I've seen since July is encouraging and exciting. There is a lot of great work happening at Newport and I'm proud to be a part of it."

#### These Highlights are quotes from CAPT Roenke:

#### NAVSTA Newport remains the Navy's:

- "World Class Center of Learning Excellence". Four of the top Five Tenants by size are schoolhouses or coordinate training. Their schedule and their students comprise most of my staff's day to day, whether that is housing officer candidates, feeding students, and otherwise making sure they can learn. On any given day there are, on average, 2,195 students onboard. Other schools include the Naval Justice School, the Religious Program Specialist "A" School, the Senior Enlisted Academy, and the USMC Aviation Logistics school.
- A World Class Center of Undersea Warfare Research, Development, Testing and Evaluation, the Naval Undersea Warfare Command Newport is our largest tenant, doing important work to keep our undersea forces capable and ready today and into the future. It is important to me to keep the lights on, the water flowing and the gates open so they talented NUWC engineers can support the fleet.
- An operational center of excellence. We frequently host visiting Destroyers and Littoral Combat Ships. More frequently we support the operations of the seven ships homeported here. These include NOAA's Research Vessels Henry B. Bigelow and Okeanos Explorer; the three buoy tenders, USCGC Oak, USCGC Ida Lewis, and USCGC Sycamore; and the Medium Endurance Cutter's Campbell and Tahoma. The NOAA and USCG missions that Naval Station Newport supports requires near-daily comings and goings. (cont.)

### 2024 As we look ahead there will be a lot going on:

- The demolition of Hooper Hall, a former Naval War College building that is no longer safe
- Restoration work on Mahan Hall wraps up then work on Conolly Hall begins while finding spaces for everyone to work.
- Projects to open a spray park at Carr Point, work on the Ball Fields there, and expand the kitchen at Leisure Bay, our coffee shop.
- We are planning to host the Save the Bay Swim again next year. We are offering Salute to Summer again. There are other surprises and events in planning that I hope to announce soon.
- Our biggest news involves the expansion of missions for our Coast Guard and NOAA partners.

Coast Guard: We recently kicked off the formal design work and impact studies for the US Coast Guard's mission expansion. In 2027 we plan on demolishing Pier 1, building a new support building and a 4 berth pier. That new pier will host at least two (possibly four) of the Coast Guard's Offshore Patrol Cutters, starting in late 2029 or early 2030. We have a number of studies ongoing that is looking at the impact of those Coast Guardsmen on traffic, gate loading, medical services, housing, and other areas. Naval Station Newport needs to be, and will be, ready to host those ships when they arrive.

**NOAA:** We will begin breaking ground on a construction project for a new NOAA pier and support building this year. This pier will host NOAA research vessels. The building will support NOAA's Office of Marine and Aviation Operations, which is responsible for the operations of all NOAA's research ships and aircraft.

The expansion of the NOAA and USCG missions at the waterfront is exciting, but requires a lot of coordination and efforts to make sure it is done in an environmentally responsible, cost-effective, and timely manner. ### 11 November: AMB. Middendorf Keel Plate Unveiling Ceremony

Lifetime Navy League Member Amb. J. William Middendorf, a Little Compton resident (pictured below in cap) has an Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer, DDG-138, named in honor of him, the USS J. William Middendorf. The former U.S. Secretary of the Navy and an U. S. Ambassador to the European Union during 1985–1987, was honored at a keel plate unveiling ceremony at the Naval War College. Military dignitaries included Ms. Jill Boward, Executive Director, Combatants, Program Executive Office Ships at the Department of the Navy and U.S. Secretary of the Navy, Carlos Del Toro and RADM Garvin, President of the Naval War College. Navy League guests are pictured on the left and included author Ken Dooley, a Lincoln, RI resident. Ken Dooley has co-authored two books with Middendorf and is a close personal friend of his.

Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro said that the "Arleigh Burke-class destroyers, built around the Aegis Combat System, are the backbone of the Navy's surface fleet. DDG-138 is the 88th ship of its class and is a fitting tribute to Middendorf, who championed the Aegis system while he was secretary of the Navy in the mid-1970s".

According to Frank Lennon of the Providence Journal, "During Middendorf's tenure (1974-1977) he increased the Navy budget by more than 60% while the Army and Air Force budgets remained relatively flat."


