NLUS National Director George Wardwell participated in the Navy Leagues' first Congressional Fly- In as part of its National Board of Directors Meeting 14 October 2013. George represented the Newport Council along with approximately eighty(80) other Navy League members from across the country who visited over one hundred (100) Congressmen and women for the purpose of discussing military readiness and the impact sequestration is having on our military men and women, military preparedness, and reduction in the military's ability to meet its mission. George was able to meet with Congressman James Langevin (D-RI) and Congressman David Cicilline (D-RI) and was able to reiterate the message "that at some point, if the decline in ship assets continues, a decision may have to be made in the future to decline requests for Humanitarian Assistance." The Fly- in was a huge success and Congress proved very receptive to the visit. The Navy League will continue with the Fly-Ins with the hope of greater participation by our members.

Angela Vars, a floral designer and co-founder of Water's Edge Flowers, operated the shop with her husband, the late Joseph P.T. Vars, until it was sold in the 1970s. Joseph was also a member of the Navy League. Angela and Anne, an accredited staging professional and designer, currently does floral design and stage for events, special occasions and homes.

Anne as a member of the Military Spouses of Newport was very happy to participate in this fundraising effort. NAVAL STAFF COLLEGE WELCOME PICNIC

The Naval Staff College is an advanced professional education program for international officers. The program was expanded in 2003 to include a 10 month course fully integrated with the NWC Naval Command and NSC curriculum. Since its inception in 1972 more than 2000 officers representing 129 countries have attended the NSC and have distinguished themselves with 313 attaining Flag Officer rank and 122 serving as Chiefs of their Services with 19 currently serving in that capacity.



NCBC Cadets did a special Color Guard event 28 September at Battleship Cove – a memorial gathering of the survivors of the USS EMMONS. In the group photo one of the Cadets is holding the

original ship's plague, which has been underwater for 65 years, just north of Okinawa's Motobu Peninsula. The plaque was stolen from the wreck, somehow recovered, and the Naval Heritage museum at Washington Navy Yard was working on stabilizing the metal and restoring the plague. They graciously agreed, after much negotiation, to allow the plaque to be brought to Battleship Cove for this gathering of EMMONS survivors and family members. The Cadet in the photo (SR Bojana Wentzell) is cradling the plague in gloved hands - no one was allowed to physically touch the plaque as it is still metallurgically fragile. SR Wentzell was thrilled to have the opportunity to hold the plaque while the EMMONS crew gathered around to view the artifact, and also scared to death that she would drop it, or worse. But she did fine - not bad for a 13 year old young lady. The NCBCs part in the ceremony was put together by ENS Jose Taboada - one of his childhood friends was the son of one of the EMMONS survivors when Jose was a Sea Cadet in New York back in the early 70s. They met up a few months back when Jose was visiting family in NY. They were reminiscing about when Jose was in uniform when he was a kid, one thing led to another and the planning for today's event began then. (David Kerwood, CO, NCBC Sea Cadets)


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE




